May 16th, 2022 – Bicycle Helmet Safety

History of Cycling Helmets

At the beginning of the 20th century, bicyclists began to use helmets made from a ring of leather wrapped around the head with a wool ring above it¹. The first device used as a modern-day helmet was developed in Bell, California, in 1954 to mitigate the consequences of risk activities for high-speed driving². In 1994 the Consumer Products Safety Commission (CPSC) developed a standard for children's bicycle helmets called the Children's Bicycle Helmet Safety act which was added to the Code of Federal Regulations in March of 1995³.

Choosing a Helmet

For the helmet to be effective and offer appropriate protection, choose a helmet that is appropriate to the type of cycling you will be doing (road, mountain biking, BMX, e-cycles). Be sure to try the helmet on and pay attention to these following points:

- It should not wobble side to side, or tilt front to back,
- It should not move when you shake your head in any direction,
- It should stay level across your forehead,
- The straps are equally tight, and the chin strap feels snug when you open your mouth,
- You should be able to slip one finger between the strap and your chin,
- It has a sticker showing it is safety-approved by the relevant safety regulators.

To Keep Your Helmet in Good Working Order

- Wash it occasionally with water and mild soap.
- Keep it in a temperate place, away from high or low temperatures.
- Store the helmet in a cloth bag or in its original packaging.

Applicable Standards

The following standards are applicable in North America for bicycle helmets: ASTM F1447, ASTM F1898, Snell B-90A, B-95, N-94, CPSC, CAN/CSA D113.2-M89.

In Europe, the NF EN 1078+A1 (February 2013) standard applies to users of bicycles, while the NF EN 1080 (April 2013) standard applies to helmets for young children⁴.

Did You Know?

- In Canada and the United States of America, municipal, provincial, and state governments' mandate who is required to wear bicycle helmets
 - Some laws apply to every age group, while other laws are specifically targeted to people aged 18 and under.
 - In some jurisdictions, there are no legal mandates in place for helmets.
- In France, according to Decree #2016-1800, wearing a helmet is mandatory for children under the age of 15.⁵
- Australia was the first country in the world to mandate bike helmets for every age in every part of the country.⁶
- Helmets are good for one hard collision or severe fall.
- The CPSC recommends that you replace your helmet every 3 to 5 years.
- If you're unsure about the integrity of the helmet, replace it.
